Nordic Urban Archaeology – experiences and new directions

Wednesday 10th - Friday 12th May 2023 in Copenhagen

During recent decades, numerous large-scale archaeological excavations have taken place in many towns and cities in the Nordic countries. Most have been rescue excavations which were not initiated by research questions or research projects. Many have nonetheless contributed to a significant increase in the volume and range of archaeological data. In addition to these new and substantial additions to the urban archaeological record, artefacts and data already stored in university and museum archives are being increasingly revisited. Despite the challenges associated with dealing with older data, this material holds a great potential for providing new results and insights relating to urban life in the past.

The conference “Nordic Urban Archaeology – experiences and new directions” is a new initiative that aims to explore the current status of urban archaeology. It will provide a forum for the presentation of papers and posters which will discuss the outcomes of excavations, research projects and other experiences rooted in urban archaeology and – not least – look ahead to see what the future holds. The conference’s goal is to enable the various experiences to generate mutual inspirations, synergies, and new collaborations and research.

Organisers

The organisers behind the conference are a group of archaeologists and researchers employed within research institutions in Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden: Hanna Dahlström from Museum of Copenhagen and Kirstine Haase from Museum Odense and UrbNet, Georg Haggrén from Turku University, Chris McLees from The Norwegian Institute for Cultural Heritage Research (NIKU) and Joakim Kjellberg from Upplandsmuseet/Medeltidsmuseet. The format emphasises the Nordic perspective as the starting point for the conference and highlights the aim to create a Nordic network of urban archaeology and ensure a strong relationship between field archaeology, collections and research.

Costs

Conference fee is 950 DKK and includes lighter lunch and coffee/tea and cake for the duration of the conference. On the evening of Wednesday 10th of May there will be a conference dinner at Madklubben København, to an additional cost of 480 DKK. Dinner includes a three-course menu, and 2 glasses of wine. Session 3

New research and old materials – challenges and perspectives in collections and archives

Moderators: Joakim Kjellberg, Upplandsmuseet/Medeltidsmuseet & Chris McLees, Norwegian Institute for Cultural Heritage Research (NIKU).

Finds and documentation have been collected and preserved for more than 100 years through urban archaeology in the medieval Nordic cities. Still, they are an often underused resource for new knowledge and urban archaeological research.

Under the headline "New research and old materials – challenges and perspectives in collections and archives", we wish to direct attention to the potential of the extensive collections and the archaeological archives as a source for new and in-depth knowledge on the social and physical spaces of the city.

The session explores:

- How older material and data from old excavations have been revived in recent research.
- How accessibility and usability of older material can be improved for research purposes.
- The threats to collections and archives. How and why archaeological material and data should be preserved for the future, considering it is a limited and non-renewable resource.

The future of Urban Archaeology


